

Quilting our heritage together

The history of quilts began long before European settlers arrived in the New World. People in nearly every part of the world had used padded fabric for clothing and bedding.

The term quilt comes from the Latin 'culcita', meaning a stuffed sack. A quilt is a cloth with a top, which is usually the decorated part, a back, and filler in the middle.

The quilt, as we know it in America, was used in necessity for providing warm covers for the beds, but the quilt also was used as hangings for doors and windows that were not sealed well enough to keep out the cold.

Over time as living conditions improved and the availability of more materials came into use, quilts became less used.

By the 1900s, quilting was transforming from a necessity into a creative artistic one and today the patterns and textures of the traditional quilts convey a colourful inspiration that captures the minds and provides for a means of expressing national pride and achievement, and a powerful reminder of our past.

A WORD FROM OUR MAYOR

We can save lives, easily.

It is essential for all of us in this difficult time to follow the instructions from our governments. These are: 1) keep 2 metres (6 feet) between individuals, wash our hands regularly and do not touch our faces, avoid going out except for essentials such as food and medicines and avoid all groups both indoors and outside.

People coming from outside the immediate area need to self-isolate for 14 days. For our summer residents who may look on Metis as a place of peace and refuge even more in this stressful time, please, this includes you as many of you come from areas of high infection rates.

The instructions from the Ministers are there for everyone.

People who are aged 70 years and older are to stay at home as much as possible. For your information, nurses from the CISSS are calling all high-risk people to determine if they are healthy and to see what they require. The 50+ group are also contacting their members daily. The dépanneurs in Métis-sur Mer (418-936-3536) and Baie-des-Sables (Chez B 418-772-6229) can deliver items to your home. Atelier culinaire Pierre-Oliver Ferry can make bread and meals and deliver them to you (418-732-4202).

The IGA can make deliveries to Métis-sur-Mer by taxi. (418-775-8915)

J.P.Durette Metro is also delivering to Métis-sur Mer. (418-775-8848)

Uniprix Pharmacy (418-775-8841) and Pharmacie Eric St-Laurent affiliated with Brunet (418-775-5175) will deliver to Métis-sur-Mer.

If you feel that you have symptoms of COVID-19 (fever, cough, difficulty breathing), call the help line 1-877-644-4545 before going to your doctor's office or the hospital and you will be given instructions to protect yourself and others.

If you need to find out what other organizations are offering services, you can telephone 418-775-8445 # 2990. When you are asked what municipality, state: Métis-sur-Mer and someone from the MRC will take your call. This is to prevent overloading of the landlines for many services.

Please be vigilant and keep our community safe and healthy.

Government instructions are there for all of us, no matter our age.

There are daily updates on the news. Please watch and listen.



The cleaning of the chimneys of your property is a simple but essential procedure to prevent fires. Did you know that the accumulation of creosote inside the chimney represents a high risk of fire that can spread to interior walls and the roof of your house?

Composting and Local Waste Management

Did you know that our waste and compostable materials are currently sent to Rivière-du-Loup? By treating everything locally, we would avoid tons of greenhouse gases and thousands of dollars in transportation. Currently our local waste and compost is transported for over 85,000 kilometers of road to be processed each year – that is more than twice the circumference of the Earth!

In the spirit of reducing our environmental impact, the MRC de La Mitis gave its approval in March to continue evaluations of a project for composting, a technical landfill (LET) and an eco-center. This project is based on the three dimensions of sustainable development: social acceptability, preservation of the environment and cost reduction. It is carried out in partnership between the RITMR Matapédia-Mitis and the MRCs of La Mitis and La Matapédia. The implementation of the project is planned for 2023-2024.

The evaluation will help answer the questions of if and when our communities will be able to return to composting locally? Currently, waste and composting materials go to Rivière-du-Loup and are not separated. If we do not send our brown bins to Rivière-du-Loup, there is no other place nearby that would accept our waste at a good price. So by treating our waste locally in a modern technical landfill, we can treat our organic materials in order to have compost.

Ultimately, the project has the potential to save us approximately \$500,000 per year for the treatment of our waste and compostable materials, which would have a positive impact on our municipal taxes. In addition, by managing locally, we will have control over spending and cost variations. There is also economic opportunity to opening the door to new projects to recover our materials here in a circular economy concept.

The exact location of the project is still under evaluation. We will keep you updated through the Green Newsletter in the coming months. For more information on this project, visit www.ecoregie.ca or call 418 775-8445, extension 1138.
