# Announcing the LIVE OUR HERITAGE logo!

Just as a picture is worth a thousand words, a logo can show—at a glance - what a company, project or group is doing, providing focus to their work. Melinda Turriff, who recently rejoined the Heritage Lower Saint Lawrence team, created this graphic for Live Our Heritage to say it all.



It has five tiles — one for each of the four components of the project - surrounding a fifth (representing the heart and hands). They symbolize the people who are the strength of the community, celebrating how we rely so much on volunteers especially in more remote regions. The color of this tile is red — the color of love and the lifeblood of the community. Through this tile, we offer a special tribute to Evelyn Annett and Kathy Dodson who not only helped Heritage get its start, but also supported, with many others, so many local causes and events, year after year.

The other tiles, on Heritage colors, are easy to identify:

A footprint on a golden background, reminds us of the pleasure we have walking along the beach and symbolizes the expanded trails.

A white and blue tile depicts the mosaics that will decorate the seats we will build – blue for the importance of the river in the area and white for the spray when the wind is up.

The needle and thread represent the quilt and textile arts our neighbours will be creating – the black representing the rocks and shoals of the area.

The camera on blue signifies the new photos we will be taking and the old ones we will collect and enjoy – blue being the clear skies we hope for (although who doesn't sometimes enjoy a fog- or snowbound day to read and relax by the fire!).



#### **LIVE OUR HERITAGE New Trails**

Heritage Lower St. Lawrence (HLSL) "Walk my Heritage" trails launched in 2014, brought Metis-sur-Mer village residents and their memories together. Now, HLSL's "Live Our Heritage" project will be bringing together new trails from the site of the old Jolly Rogers westward to Grand Metis, including features of interest on Lighthouse Point and Leggatt's Point, for our residents and visitors alike to enjoy. We'll also be adding a Station Road and a Concessions Trail, and expanding our original walking tour to capture history missed when the first trails were done.

The new trail will travel through history from yesterday to one hundred years ago and capture the voices and

# LIVE OUR HERITAGE: the "Quilting our heritage together" project








#### A Word from the President

# Introducing Isabelle Dion, our new recreation resource for the Municipalities of Baie-des-Sables and Métis-sur-Mer




Recreation is what we do with the free time after all our demands and obligations have been dealt with.

# Ville de Métis-sur-Mer: Participatory Budget (Continued...)

#### **Procedure**

The call for projects will begin on March 1 and citizens will be able to submit their projects until June 1, 2020. A selection committee will be created to judge each project according to pre-established criteria. Participants may be invited to present their project in more detail. The selection committee is committed to identifying a winning project by July 1, 2020. (The project chosen must be completed before the end of 2020.) In addition to seeing their project completed, the person who submitted it will be invited to participate in its implementation.

#### Rule

Interested people can submit their project via a committee or personally. Only one project per person will be eligible. Projects may be submitted in print via a letter deposited at the municipal office at 138 rue Principale, Métis-sur-Mer or by email to metissurmer@mitis.qc.ca in accordance with the framework and criteria below. Projects must aim for development of recreation and culture of Métis-sur-Mer through the purchase of equipment or assets. Events or non-durable assets are not eligible for this call for projects.

#### Project criteria

- Inspired by Politique Familiale et Municipalité amie des aînés (MADA)
- As much as possible, to reach the entire population
- Be achievable before the end of the year and not exceed \$15,000

#### Selection committee

The selection committee will be formed and authorized by the Council of the Town of Métis-sur-Mer. It will consist of two members of the Town Council, a member of the Métis-sur-Mer Local Development Committee, a member of the Métis-sur-Mer Recreation Committee and our Intermunicipal Recreation Coordinator. The decisions of this committee will be based on an absolute majority.

#### Framework

In order to have a presentation structure and as much detail as possible, we ask you to submit your projects according to the specific framework. An application form can be obtained on the Town's website and at the municipal office. Please answer the questions and observe the criteria. The selection committee may ask you for more details or for a presentation.

#### DANGER OF FREEZING: LET WATER RUN

The Town of Métis-sur-Mer asks all users of the aqueduct network who had frozen water problems to let a small stream of water run from a tap in their residence to avoid the danger of frozen pipes due to the severity of the winter.

#### **COLLECTION OF LARGE OBJETS**

From now, citizens will no longer have to contact the municipal office for the big garbage collection. However, you should always put your items next the road the day before the collection. The next dates for the collection are May 27, July 29 and September 30. Construction materials remain prohibited. Thank you.

#### **CHIMNEY SWEEPING**

Having your chimneys cleaned is a simple but essential procedure. The accumulation of creosote inside the chimney represents a high risk of fire. In addition, a chimney fire can reach the interior walls and the roof of your house.

You can consult the list of the chimney cleaners accredited by the Association des professionnels du chauffage (APC), recognized by the Régie du Bâtiment du Québec, at the following address: www.poelesfoyers.ca.

It is no longer necessary to call the municipal office to check in, the municipality no longer keeps a reservation list. You must contact a chimney sweep of your choice directly to carry out the work. Thank you.



# Info-prévention



#### KITCHEN FIRES

It's good to remember that in Quebec 1 in 3 fires starts in the kitchen... and that almost half of these fires are caused by human error. Cooking is more than just routine ... it is often done distractedly, despite the fact that a kitchen fire can cause burns, property loss and even death. Because we want only delicious meals coming out of your kitchen, rather than fire, here are a few tips.

#### Precautions to avoid fires:

- Always keep an eye on food that is cooking, and use a timer.
- To fry food, use a thermostatic fryer (never heat oil in a pot).
- Use a container with a diameter greater than or equal to the heating element. Food overflowing on the element could cause a fire.
- Have a cover handy. If it is not the container's original cover, make sure it can cover the pot or pan completely.
- Don't store objects in the oven or on the stove.
- Keep a portable fire extinguisher within a few meters of the stove, and learn how to use it.

- Keep paper or plastic items and fabrics away from the heating elements.
- Regularly clean the appliances, especially the receptacles under the stove burners and oven elements as well as the hood fan.
- Don't use the self-cleaning function if a lot of residue has accumulated at the bottom of the oven because it could ignite.

#### Tips to avoid burns:

- Turn pot-handles inward so that they do not protrude from the stove.
- Wear tight-fitting clothes or roll up your sleeves.
- Use insulated oven mitts to move pots.
- Avoid carpets that do not adhere well to the floor to avoid tripping while carrying hot pots.
- Beware of steam when you remove a pot lid or pour; steam can cause serious burns.

#### What to do in case of fire:

- If your clothes catch fire, drop to the ground and roll over and over, covering your face with your hands.
- Do not attempt to move a flaming pot.
- Never throw water on a flaming pot.
- Never try to put a fire on a stove or in the oven with water.
- Using an insulated oven mitt, place a lid on the container to smother the flames.
- If possible, turn off the stove and the hood fan.
- If necessary, use a portable fire extinguisher.
- Call the fire department, even if the fire seems to be out as it may have seeped into the hood duct.
- If the fire is out but there is an accumulation of smoke, open the windows and doors to ventilate, then evacuate your home.
- If the fire spreads, close windows and doors if you have time, evacuate your home quickly and call 9-1-1.
- Replace or have your stove/cooking appliance inspected before using it again.

# The Green Newsletter - « Refund system and the blue bin »

Hello,

At the beginning of the year, the Quebec government made two major announcements in less than two weeks regarding the world of recycling: one about the expansion of the refundable system and the other about a reform of the recycling system.

It's done – the government will widen the refund system to include all ready-to-drink beverage containers from 100 ML to 2 liters, whether they are made of plastic, glass or metal, beginning with glass bottles of wine first, and then to multilayer milk and juice containers later. The industries responsible for these containers have one year to develop a plan and the new refund system will come into effect in the fall of 2022. Many questions remain: where will the drop-off points be and will they be easily accessible? Will recycling be done nearby in our regions or in major centres, which will increase transport and greenhouse gases? Will the penalties provided for the industry in the event of failure to meet the recovery objectives be dissuasive enough to force a system that works?

Also, the government announced that the industries generating recyclable materials will be responsible for the sorting and recycling of their products from 2022, with a transition period that will end in 2025. Currently, municipalities pay for treatment of those materials, but receive compensation that covers about 90 % of the costs. The idea of this reform is that the industry will then have the incentive to market a product that is easy to recycle because it will be responsible for disposal. Again, several questions arise: will we have the assurance that materials will sorted regionally or will they centralize it? How will this reform be integrated with the new modernization of the refund system? Will the industry, which will pass the bill on to consumers, pay for a dual-processing system for returnable products? Will industry be asked to work on more efficient solutions such as source reduction and reuse?
